Allows for electronic mailing between anyone with an email address. Since you're under age 13, your parents will need to sign up for an account for you, or sign a permission slip if you're using email at school.

Private Information

Things that should never be revealed online, even when contained in a photograph:

Addresses – where you live

Names – your real name and the names of your family members

Phone Numbers – your house and cell phone numbers

Pets – the names, types, and appearance of your animals

Locations – where you are

License Plates – the letters and numbers specific to your vehicle

Sports Uniforms – the colors and logos that identify your team

Uncomfortable Requests

Strategies for responding to requests that make you feel nervous, scared, or uncomfortable:

Change the Subject – talk about something else

Ignore the Request – don't respond and don't acknowledge the request

Block the Person – add them to your blacklist or block them from contacting you

Tell a Trusted Adult – ask a parent, guardian, teacher, or other adult for help
